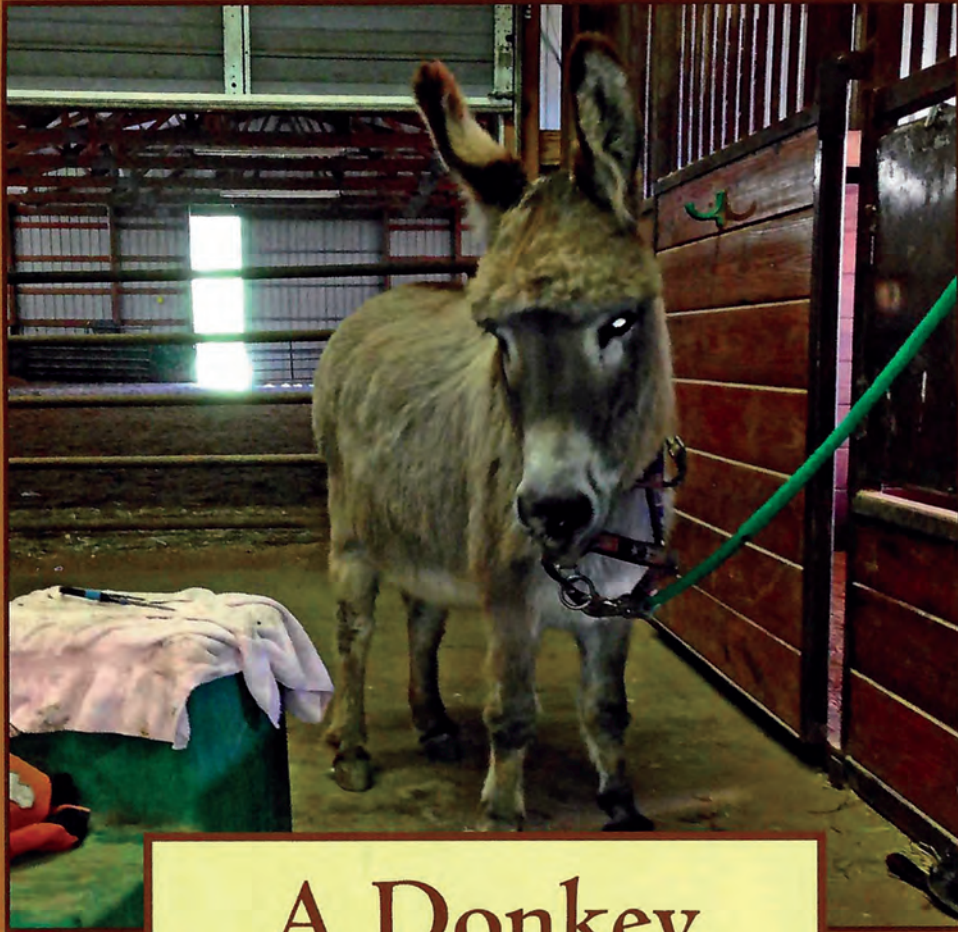

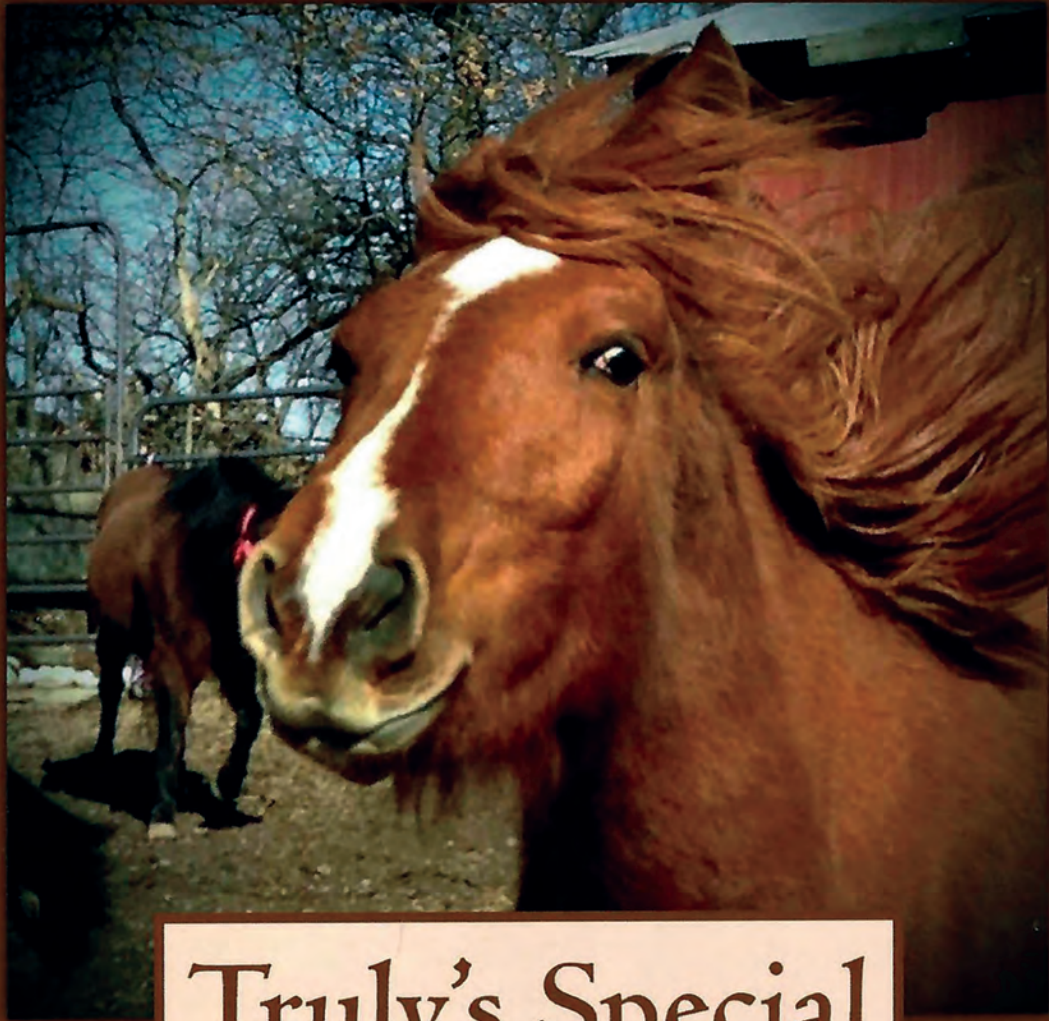

Her name is Truly.



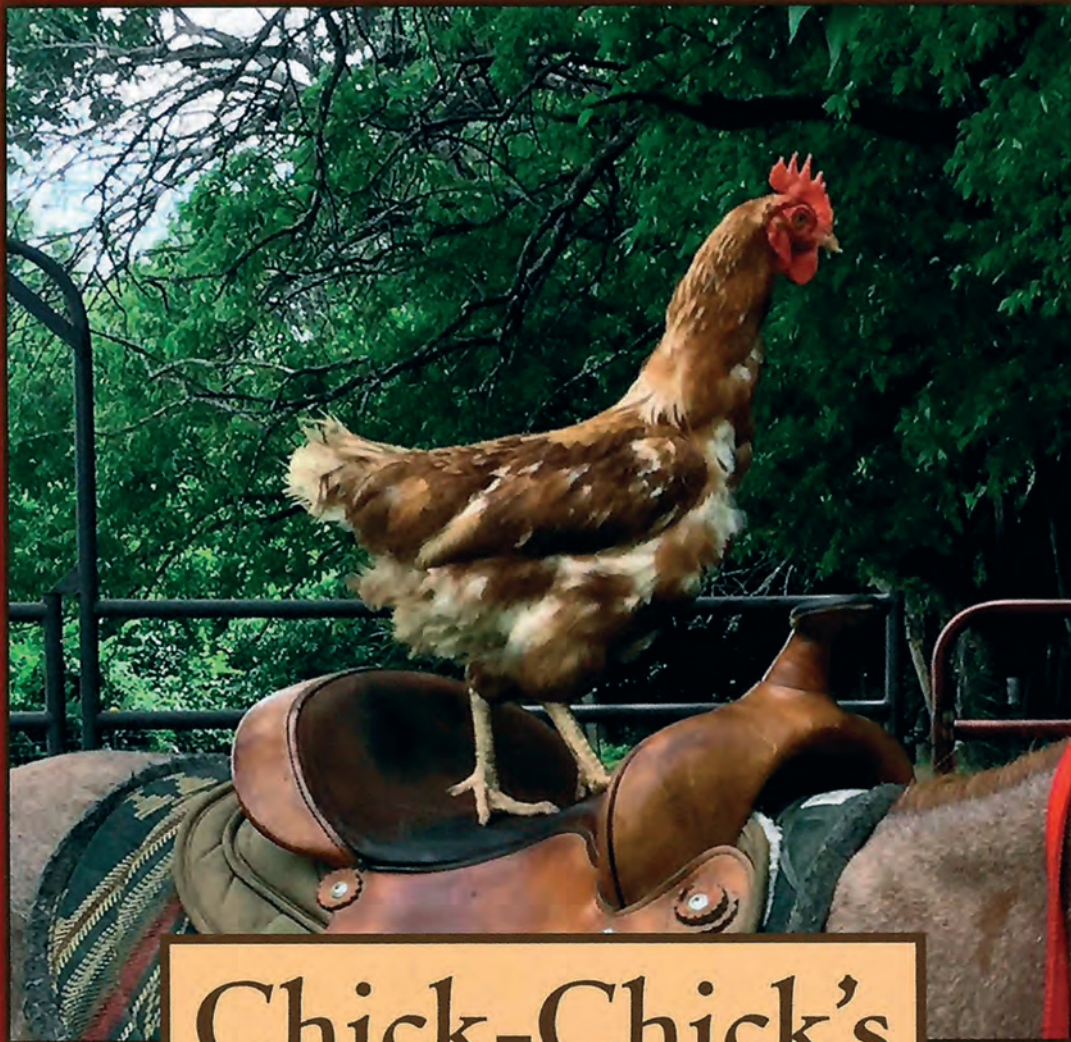
When my Mama Truly

my chicken friends.

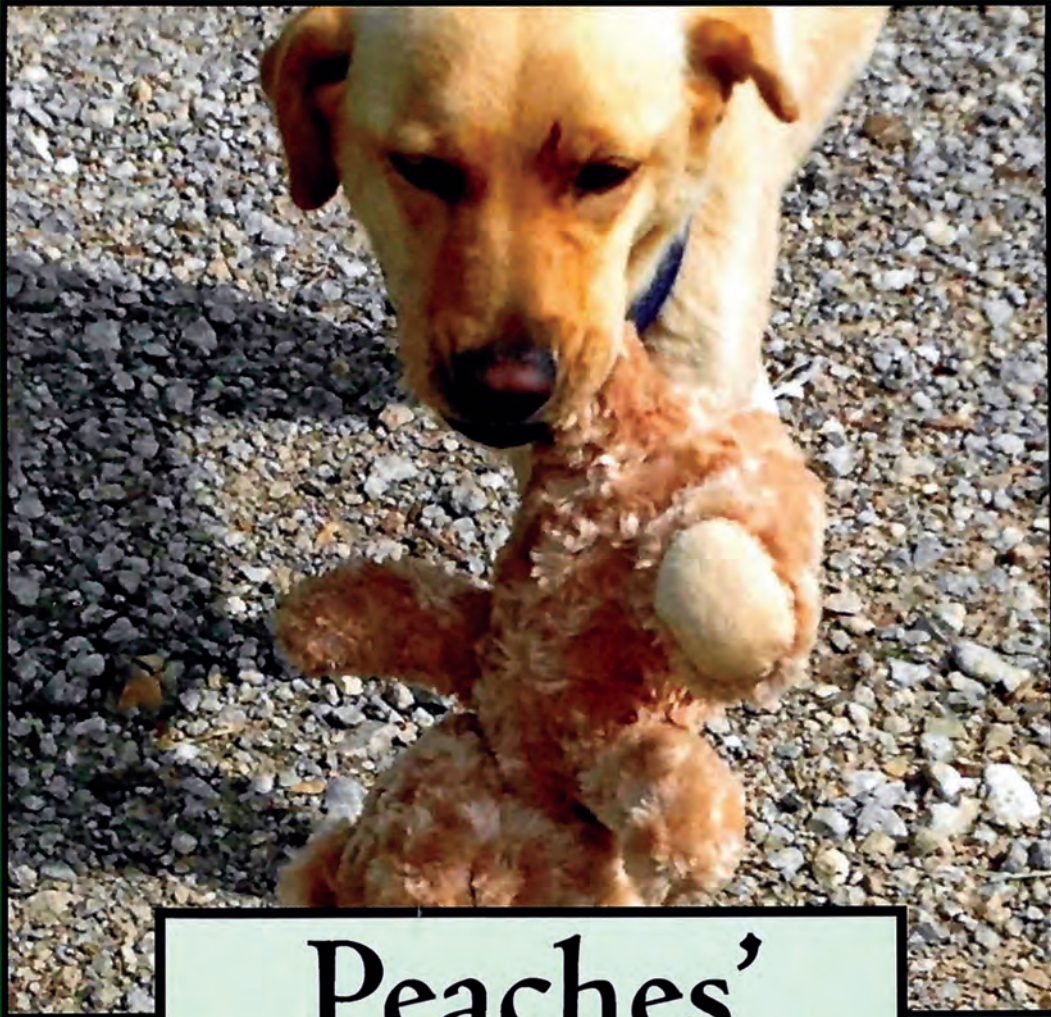


We chickens lay eggs

Good Bears of the World is a bunch of people all over the world who give teddy bears to kids (and adults too) who are lonely, hurt, sick, or traumatized.

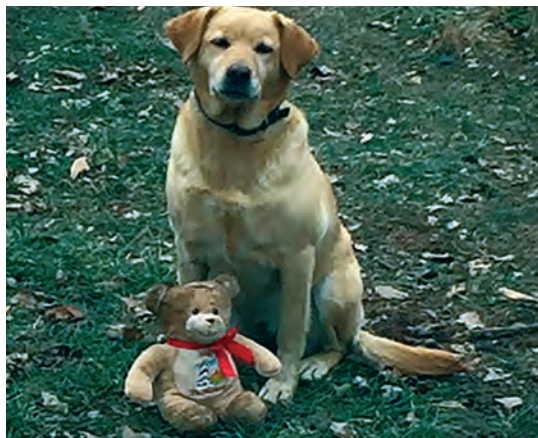
